

Adult Sunday school class for the New Year!

Beginning Sunday, January 19, Susan Clawson will lead the Adult Sunday School class in an eleven-week study of what it means to be a "Matthew 25 church," and how we can declare our church a Matthew 25 church. The 25th chapter of Matthew, a study topic recommended by the General Assembly (PCUSA), relates three parables: the Ten Virgins, the Talents, and the Sheep and Goats (Whenever you did it unto the least of these, you did it unto me).



General Assembly has identified three requirements for a Matthew 25 church: **fight poverty, promote congregational vitality,** and **promote racial equality**. We will begin our study with the book *Neighborhood Church*, a book recommended by the co-moderators of General Assembly. We will view short videos introducing each of the five chapters of this book. We will supplement this with readings from some other sources. We have several copies of *Neighborhood Church*. Copies of the other readings will be provided. All are welcome to gather in the Board Room for the class, Sundays at 9:15, coffee in hand.

Three Kings Day AKA Epiphany AKA Twelfth Night is January 6



The role of three kings is taken very seriously. Some men even grow their beards months before, says Florence Vargas, a ruling elder and women's leader at the Presbyterian Church in San Sebastian,

January 6 is Epiphany, a Christian feast day that celebrates the revelation of God incarnate as Jesus Christ. It is traditionally the day the three kings arrived at the manger. The eve of the feast is traditionally celebrated as Twelfth Night, the twelfth night after Christmas. In Great Britain, it was celebrated with wassailing, similar to caroling, and a punch called wassail. In Spain and Latin America, children traditionally observe Three Kings Day on January 6. They put out fresh grass and water for the camels and sometimes cigars for the Magi. The

church has no gift exchange in December, but the children receive small gifts on Epiphany Sunday, and Los Reyes Magos (the Magi) visit instead of Santa Claus.

Celebrations are often held in homes, culminating in a *rosca de reyes* (Three Kings Cake) with a plastic figure of Baby Jesus hidden in the c ake. The baby is described as hiding in a safe place from Herod, who intended him harm. Sometimes the Three Kings Cake is served at a church coffee hour. This tradition was featured last year in the January issue of *Presbyterians Today*, available in



the archives online at https://www.presbyterianmission.org. In France, people celebrate Epiphany by adding the three kings to the nativity scene and eating a galette des rois (Kings' cake) with a baby inside. The one who get the baby (or sometimes a pea or a bean) is king for the day and gets to wear a paper crown. (Photographs from *Presbyterians Today*, January 2019.)

After the tables were refreshed, shopping began again, in reverse order to the first round.
