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GENEVA CENTER AND SUMMER CAMPS

OVERVIEW

Geneva Center is now an independent entity titled Geneva Center Inc. that operates the Geneva Retreat, Camp & Conference Center, 5282 N Old Hwy 31, Rochester, IN 46975. To find out more about Geneva Center, please visit https://genevacenter.org (If the link doesn't work, copy it into your browser and try again.) Geneva Center Inc. was split off from Wabash Valley Presbytery in an attempt to balance the budget, and the effort has been largely successful. By appealing to a wider audience, the new entity has been able to cover operating expenses with income this past year. Other income from gifts and donations are designated to cover capital improvements and repairs.

The site contains 235 wooded acres and 13 buildings. The Center is open year-round and welcomes all reservations. Those served included churches, non profits, schools or universities, government-related organizations, and private groups.

Despite marketing the site to a wider audience, the Center continues close ties with Wabash Valley Presbytery and Presbyterians. Of the 29 churches that used the facilities last year, 18, or slightly more than half, were Presbyterian related.


FROM CE COMMITTEE:

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

From January 19 to April 12, the Adult Sunday School class is participating in an eleven-week study of what it means to be a "Matthew 25 church," and how we can declare our church a Matthew 25 church. General Assembly has identified three requirements for a Matthew 25 church: **fight structural poverty, promote congregational vitality,** and **promote institutional racial equality**.

We believe we already do quite a bit to address structural poverty in our mission giving and activities. On February 23, we concluded our study of *Neighborhood Church*, a book that addressed congregational vitality. In March, we will take up structural racism and the goal of institutional equality.

We can find in our history some historical contact with diversity. Father Carnahan, our founding pastor, spoke under the Old Oak Tree to an audience of both settlers and local Potawatomi peoples who lived south of town. The Potawatomi also shopped in town at Samuel Favorite's store. A small black boy climbed to the top of that Old Oak Tree in 1856 to raise a flag in support of the candidate of the new Republican Party, which opposed the spread of slavery. Adam Pinkerton, our Clerk of Session, was an ardent abolitionist, as were several others in town, and in the fall of 1861 so many Sunday School teachers and pupils volunteered for the Union Army that the school had to





close early. We will start by contemplating some short excerpts that illustrate the time distance between enslavement and today. We will study readings from White Fragility by Robin D'Angelo and Waking Up White by Debby Irving that illustrate some surprising, and not so surprising, instances of institutional inequality. We will also spend a day on the removal of the Potawatomi in 1838 when that nation was forcibly marched West. The Potawatomi south of town are thought to have left at that time. Readings for this section of the course will be provided. If you are interested, both books are available in paperback, and you can download inexpensive digital versions of White Fragility (PDF, eBay) and Waking Up White (Kindle, Amazon).

All are welcome to gather in the Board Room for the class, Sundays at 9:15, coffee in hand.


Explorer Camp


